HE CURTAIN RISES

The 16th edition of the Amity International Model United Nations (AIMUN) commenced with grandeur and grace at Amity University, Noida, upholding its legacy as one of the most prestigious diplomatic simulations in the country. The event started with a ceremonial lamp lighting to invoke the divine blessings through the chanting of the Gayatri Mantra by Amitasha students setting the tone for enlightenment, unity and peace.

NSIGHTS FROM THE COMMITTEE SPEAKERS

Mr. Ashok Sajjanhar Former Ambassador to Kazakhstan, Sweden & Latvia



Ambassador Mr. Ashok Sajjanhar reminisced about the memories he made while negotiating for India in WTO and its evolvement from a biased and unorganised setting into a formal organisation. Moreover, he also educated the delegates of the basic fundamentals and principles of the World Trade Organization and how it ensures certainty and predictability in global economies. He also mentioned the historical context for the committee emphasizing the need for WTO and its formation.

Major General Nalin Bhatia, SM Retired Indian Army Officer, Defence Analyst and Author



Major General Nalin Bhatia highlighted the growing prominence of proxy wars, explaining that many countries now find it easier to engage in conflicts through proxies rather than direct warfare. Nations consider it a cheaper and less demanding alternative as compare to open war. He further mentioned that although global organizations, particularly the United Nations, have discussed the issue, there has been no concrete international effort to curb the use of proxies. According to him, open dialogue between countries can help resolve minor incidents or incursions amicably.

Dr. A K Anil Kumar Group Director - ISRO Indian Space Research Organization



Dr. AK Anil Kumar, Group Director, ISRO. He briefed on asteroid threats, giving background information on the Chicxulub impactor, the asteroid that struck Earth about 66 million years ago. He expanded on the current threat of asteroids and Near-Earth Objects (NEOs) to Earth, and mentioned potential solutions, emphasizing the importance of international cooperation.

Q. Beyond knowledge, how can schools shape global citizens?

COMMITTEE REPORTS



The beginning to the wonderful proceeding was embarked with the Executive board briefing about the rules of procedure. The World Trade Organisation deliberated upon the current modifications in the tariffs arrangements following Trump's reelection. They also debated on how to fix the growing war and control the consequences. The committee began with an electrifying speech by former Ambassador Mr. Ashok Sajjanhar, on the history and relevance of WTO, who began by explaining his connection with the committee and his experience as a delegate in the WTO. He went on to talk about the need to form the WTO and the historical content to it. After this the committee began its proceedings in which a lot of inter-delegate targeting and heated debates took place with accusations flying left and right with each country voicing its hardships.

The committee began with roll call and the chair briefing the house about the rules of procedures. Once the stage was set the proceedings began. The delegate of China delivered a fiery GSL which condemned the shutting of the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission in the United States, and the latter did not back down either, with a moving and laudable speech in the Moderated Caucus. The delegate of Belgium made emphasis on the 'Matilda Effect', which explains the academic invisibility of women, and proposed the 'Matilda Corrective Action Mandate', an initiative driven by creativity and an aim to address systemic gender bias. Notably, the countries in the committee unanimously decided to dismiss the presence of Blocs, owing to the fact that they wished to avoid any divide in the solutions offered by different coalitions.

The Philippines championed indigenous learning and Russia arrived armed with acronyms (the MEEF Framework). But the true showstopper? The President gave a mini masterclass on treaties, explaining that agreements sound lovely; until someone forgets to implement them. The United Nations General Assembly- Disarmament and International Security Committee began with the Executive Board explaining the rules of procedure, easing the first-time participants. Deliberating on "Preventing the Proliferation of Hypersonic Weapons and Cyber Warfare Threats" led to a productive GSL debate. The Delegate of China drew attention by making bloc members sign commitment notices, while heated exchanges arose between Iran and Israel over compliance with UN nuclear treaties. The Delegate of Azerbaijan highlighted the struggles of geographically vulnerable nations, while calling for better adherence to international treaties.

The session concluded with delegates displaying strong diplomacy, setting a constructive tone for the conference ahead.

The first committee session began with Major General Nalin Bhatia's speech. He expanded on escalating nuclear activities and proxy conflicts in the Middle East and South Asia. The WHO convened to combat antibiotic resistance, a growing threat projected to cause 10 million deaths annually by 2050. Day 1 saw procedural clarifications followed by a GSL, where delegates from nations including Uzbekistan, South Africa, Bahamas, Singapore etc. discussed solutions such as prudent antibiotic use and stronger health systems in low-income countries. Notable incidents included the Russian delegate exceeding their time despite the EB asking them to stop thrice and a snark at Croatia by the delegate of Uzbekistan who said - "The health minister of Croatia is only interested in bribes." After lunch, discussions resumed energetically, with solutions and collaboration emphasized. The session concluded successfully, setting the stage for more debates, moderated caucuses, and action plans tomorrow.

However, some delegates proposed an alternative approach. Satish Chandra Samanta advocated for Bengali and other Dravidian languages to serve as national languages, with Hindi and English as secondary, emphasizing, "We demand equity, not imposition."
