The second wave was immediate, rapid, and it washed away the peaceful base of Day 1 with raging waters. Russia began, stating every known fact against Iran, and that it's developing weapons should be neutralized. It moved to the India-Pakistan relations, and how proof of Pakistani terrorism comes with the proxy group training camps along it's borders. A crystal clear argument. Iran shoots back that they called for nuclear transparency, yet found Israel hesitant to sign the Middle East and South Asia Nuclear Confidence Pact, increasing tensions between the countires. Russia was called out for continuing uranium trade with Pakistan, and the debate extended into the nuclear accusations. Day 2 was truly a bountiful hurricane.

Day 2 of the WHO committee began with rekindled energy as the delegates prepared for another productive session. After clarifications on joint statements and continuation of the GSL, a moderated caucus on AMR surveillance and data-sharing initiated by the delegate of Croatia ensued. The discussion saw active participation, including a notable exchange between the delegate of USA raising a POI against the delegate of Brazil for criticising countries like Liberia while allegedly misusing public funds for drug misuse themselves. This led to a short cross-questioning round between the two. More such cross questioning took place between various delegates like Malta and Belgium. The session concluded successfully, marked by strong collaboration, sharper arguments, and renewed enthusiasm for continued progress on Day 3.

On day 2, Kanhaiyalal Maneklal Munshi argued for promoting Hindi as the Union language while advocating for English as the global language for education. Many agreed, wanting provincial languages to be taught in their respective states. People advocated for Hindustani, in a non-sanskritized way to reflect unity. A delegate stated wanting a 15-year transitional period for English. C. Rajagopalachari stated "Kya ek bhaasha doosron par thopi gayi, toh Bharat ki ekta ki buniyad hil jayegi". The committee held two moderated caucuses. The assembly leaned towards neutrality and Hindustani, avoiding forced Hindi imposition. All in all, there was a boost in energy and notable progress has been made since Day 1.

On its second day, ISAM reconvened with the continuation of the General Speakers' List. Delegates from Italy, Israel, and Japan presented strategies aimed at mitigating the imminent asteroid threats. Subsequently, the delegate of Japan proposed a motion to enter a moderated caucus on the topic, "Deliberation on the sharing of data and technology with regard to planetary defense," which was approved by a decisive majority. The ensuing deliberations, spearheaded by the delegations of Brazil, Portugal, and Canada, were marked by insightful analysis and robust dialogue. The moderated caucus concluded with compelling addresses from the United Kingdom and Turkey, after which the committee transitioned into an unmoderated caucus. The session proved both effective and productive, leaving delegates energized and eager for the forthcoming crisis discussions.

The committee session began with the Executive Board briefing the delegates on fundamental rules of procedure that beginners often overlooked, such as avoiding firstperson pronouns and moderating their speaking pace. Following this, the EBs resumed the Moderated Caucus, which turned out to be a lively and intense discussion, complete with emphatic table bangs accompanying each statement. The United States, in particular, faced intense scrutiny, with its delegate being grilled on everything from basic political principles to alleged mismanagement of the nation. While the Executive Board intervened to remind delegates to stay on topic, the session concluded on a productive note.



The committee began by recognising new speakers for GSL. While the committee started off at a slow pace, it slowly gained momentum. The delegate of Turkey, in their speech, criticized the USA, China, and the UK for covering up structural gaps as skill limitations, due to which gender gaps persist. The delegate of China utilized a Yield of Remaining Time, and proceeded to defend its stance against statements made by other delegates on Day 1 of the conference, and stated that it was not anti-Islam but was anti-terrorist and highlighted its commitment to ensure equality for all. However, the delegate was questioned by the Co-Vice Chair, regarding the support China extended to Pakistan post the Pahalgam Attacks, to which the delegate responded by making a controversial statement-"the attacks were an act of defense and are called otherwise by India, which continues to spread propaganda".

Day 2 session at UNESCO witnessed a remarkable display of diplomacy as delegates delivered confident and well-articulated speeches before engaging in a dynamic Moderated Caucus on education in post-conflict regions. The discussions emphasized key priorities such as rebuilding schools, retraining educators, and revitalizing education systems — all grounded in the belief that schools serve as the true gateways to peace. Delegates proposed several innovative approaches, including solar-powered classrooms and trauma-informed teaching, reflecting a collective understanding that education transcends policy—it embodies recovery, resilience, and hope. The session concluded on an uplifting note, signaling steady progress toward tackling these vital global challenges ~Chhavi Gupta





Day 2 of the UNGA-DISEC reopened with the continuation of the GSL and frequent "Delegates, no crosstalk!" reminders from the Executive Board. Bosnia reiterated the risks of sponsoring nuclear weapon development by non-state actors, while the USA bloc gained momentum through strong lobbying. A highlight was South Africa accusing China of trading nuclear-related chemicals for oil, earning enthusiastic table taps, to which China sharply responded by condemning "false facts", leading to the committee's amusement. Despite six failed motions, the debates remained spirited and engaging. The day concluded with modest progress, setting the stage for more decisive action on the final day.
